



Then Dominiq had an accident.

No greater grief:

an unexpected tragedy

His message on the day of his son's funeral:

"Two weeks ago a woman just for a moment did not look, or pause to contemplate. Her eyes were closed to an oncoming motorcycle. The tragic result of her decision was the death of my son who we buried today. God demands faith from us. Faith leads somewhere; He that believes **and is baptized** shall be saved."

But James was not baptized.

A message on the day of his son's funeral:

"My son, James, like most young people struggled to engage in this course of life. If there is any one small token of value in his death, it is the trumpet call to make excellent choices.

Stare with us at his body today...choose your friends well. Choose the places you go to, so they improve you, fill your minds with brave endeavor, choose to generously give away for others and embrace an endearing place for God in your passions so that He can fill your life with the richest meaning."

To the Ecclesia:

BRO. DAVID LEVIN

"Comfort doesn't come from intellectualizing;

it comes from being human and allowing grief to have its full expression. We tend to think that displays of emotion mean we lack faith. Just the opposite is true. Our grief shows our love for the deceased and his family; it shows our understanding of mortality and all of its horrible events; it gives us opportunity to show unity, support, love, care, and compassion. Please don't try to short circuit the value of grief. People who are traumatized and aren't processing very much anyway.

Hugs and tears and even sitting in silence with them communicates more than words."

Allow a place for grief; validate feelings.



How to relate to someone suffering from severe grief:

- Save theology for another time. There's a place for it later, but not in the trauma of loss. Instead, be sympathetic.
- Avoid saying: "I know what you're feeling." They know you don't. Better to say: "I can't imagine what this is like for you. I have no words, but I'm here."
- Help comforts more than words. Don't say: "Let me know if I can
 do anything." Do say: "Tell me what you need right now." Help with meals,
 cleaning, lightening the burden of daily affairs.
- Avoid sayings that attempt to alleviate the pain of grief; better
 to be a good listener. You don't have to have answers; you can listen,
 acknowledge, cry, reminisce, and be present in silence.

Practical support in loss:

- There is no such thing as recovery from a major loss. Hearts
 are broken that time can't heal. Peace comes when we reconcile to loss.
 That anchor is hope.
- In the months to come, be careful not to avoid them. The first year is the worst. Beyond that, it's good to ask how they are doing. Mention the name of the one that is lost; share your own sadness.
- Sometimes the bereaved have a change in their social circles. Accept these shifts; allow their own timetable.

EXTENTS

"On the map before me, there are four rivers which flow together, and at length form a river which falls in to the Persian Gulf. This indicates the country called *Eden*, which is watered by these rivers. This country, in after ages, came to be denominated *'the Garden of the Lord'*; and the kings who reigned in it, *'the Trees of Eden.'* So that the name of it came to be applied...more especially as the future *paradise* is to occupy a considerable portion of its ancient limits."

"In the Septuagint, the word garden is transferred without translation. *Paradise* is a Persian word adopted into the Greek and expressed in Hebrew as *pardes*. It signifies a park, a forest, or preserve; a garden of trees of various kinds, a delightful grove. It is found in these texts: 'I made me gardens (*paradises*) and orchards, and I planted trees in them of all kinds of fruits,' and 'A garden enclosed (a *paradise*) is my sister spouse.' The latter text is representative of that part of Eden over which Solomon reigned; and metaphorical of its beauty, fertility, and glory, when the Heir of the vineyard, the 'greater than Solomon' shall come to Zion, and 'marry the land' of Eden, as defined in the everlasting covenant with Abraham."

































Isaiah 25:6-9 (KJV)
